Study Results Show the Evidence-Based Effectiveness of Protect Our Students



- **87**% were **INSPIRED** to take a more active role in child sexual abuse (CSA) prevention and response on their campus.
- 94% found the content to be RELEVANT to the issues and concerns that NC staff face regarding CSA.
- **95**% said the training provided them with **PRACTICAL** information that made them better prepared to identify and respond to CSA and trafficking related concerns or situations that they might encounter.
- 90% felt the amount of information included in the training was NECESSARY and MANAGEABLE.
- 86% found Protect Our Students to be as or more ENGAGING than similar trainings.
- 94% found the navigation tools to be CLEAR and EASY TO OPERATE.
- 94% felt the module FUNCTIONED PROPERLY without any technical difficulties.

Are staff prepared to identify and respond to CSA and trafficking after Protect Our Students?¹



97% FEEL INFORMED ON THE ISSUE OF CSA

Study results show that 97% of staff feel informed regarding child sexual abuse after the training versus 46% before. Additionally, 95% of staff feel informed about child sex trafficking after the training versus 31% before.



88% FEEL PREPARED TO IDENTIFY WARNING SIGNS

As a result of the training, 88% of staff feel equipped to identify the signs of sexually abused juveniles versus 26% before. Also, 87% of staff feel prepared to identify the signs of trafficking juveniles versus 18% before.



92% FEEL EQUIPPED TO FOLLOW NC REPORTING LAWS

Upon completion, 92% of staff feel equipped to follow NC mandatory reporting laws for reporting to police and DSS. Prior to the training, only 34% felt equipped to report to police and 35% to report to DSS. Additionally, 91% of staff feel prepared to assist a child who disclosed abuse or trafficking after the training versus 32% before.

Post-training survey respondents indicated they planned to take these actions after the training as it related to a specific child or situation that came to mind during the training.¹

Do the study results support the use of the training as a trauma-informed resource?¹



YES. After completing the training, 92% of participants with a prior history of sexual abuse responded that the training was a positive or necessary experience; including participants who felt the training was a neutral experience increased it to 97%. In comparison, 91% of those with no prior sexual abuse felt the training was a positive or necessary experience; counting those who felt the training was a neutral experience increased it to 98%.
